Notes from the Nurse Justine Dowe, RN



Parents and Guardians,

Did you know? Handwashing can prevent 1 in 3 diarrhea-related sicknesses and 1 in 5 respiratory infections, such as a cold or the flu.

Parents and caretakers play an important role in teaching children to wash their hands. Handwashing can become a lifelong habit if you start teaching it at an early age.

Teach kids the five steps of handwashing: Wet – lather – scrub – rinse – dry

Also teach them the key times to wash their hands, such as after using the bathroom and before eating. You can find ways to make it fun, like making up your own handwashing song or turning it into a game.

Building handwashing skills takes time. At first, your child will need regular reminders of how and when to wash hands, It is especially important to remind children to wash their hands after using the bathroom, before eating, after touching pets, after playing outside, and after coughing, sneezing or blowing their nose. But, once handwashing becomes a habit and a regular part of your child's day, they will practice it throughout their lives.

Young children learn by imitating the behaviors of adults in their lives. When you make handwashing part of your routine, you're setting an example for your children to follow.
